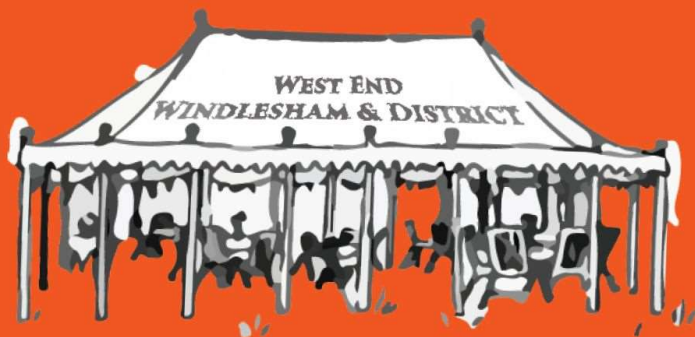

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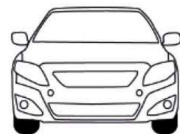
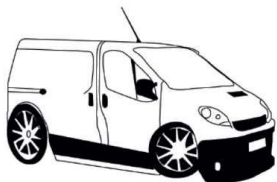

THE WOMEN'S INSTITUTE CUP COMPETITION 2023

The WI competition held within the Annual Show was first promoted in 1984 and was open to all local WI groups and below is how it was advertised in the schedule of 1984.

This year at our Annual Show, we propose to use the same list of items that was used in 1984. The original silver cup will be awarded for the best group and there is also a cup for the best flower arrangement:

1. Floral Art – using fresh flowers and foliage – up to 2 ft overall, no accessories allowed
2. Jar of Jam - any variety
3. Jar of Chutney – must be at least 3 months old
4. Victoria Jam Sandwich – jam, no cream
5. Apple Tart – presented on a plate
6. Hand-knitted Article
7. Piece of Handicraft
8. A Painting – not from a kit
9. Something new from something old – please include a photo of the original item
10. Three Roses – any variety

COMPETITION RULES & NOTES

- No exhibit to have been shown before
- Display must include a card stating the title and listing the eight items to be judged
- Individual tables provided 6' x 2'3". Frontal settings required. Additional staging permitted using simple draped or stretched fabric in keeping with the overall colour scheme - no vertical limit and no additional embellishment.
- A maximum of three accessories allowed on the table for staging or decoration, but items which could be confused with those intended for judging must be clearly marked 'for display only'
- All other rules as per schedule on P25 - 26. PLEASE READ

Judging by the SHOW JUDGES will be on a point system of up to 10 points for each item and up to 10 points for overall presentation.

Two cups will be awarded:

1. Best Group
2. Best Flower Arrangement

ENTRY FEE: £3.00 payable to the Society and to be sent to the Secretary by the closing date of 2nd September 2023.

NPM - Natural Plant Material - Any vegetable matter, including fresh, dried, garden, made up plant material, flowers, foliage, fruit, vegetables, berries, cones, fungi, nuts etc.

Glamorgan Honey Fruit Cake Recipe - For Class 85

Ingredients:

225g Self-raising flour	½ tsp. baking powder	pinch of salt
125g butter	225g honey	2 eggs
125g sultanas	125g raisins	50g candied peel
50g candied cherries	½ tsp. freshly ground nutmeg	milk as required

Method: Preheat oven to 175°C, gas mark 4, grease & line a 20cm round cake tin. Cream the butter and honey together. Add the eggs alternately, with flour, salt, baking powder and nutmeg. Add the dried fruits, peel and cherries, beat lightly to ensure ingredients bind well together. If the mixture is too stiff, add a little milk. Pour into the prepared cake tin and bake for 1¼ - 1½ hours until well risen and evenly browned. Remove from tin and cool on a wire rack.

Display on a plate or board, protected with clear film.

RULES AND REGULATIONS

N.B - The attention of intending exhibitors is directed to Rules 4, 5, 6, & 7 and to the closing date for entries - the Saturday preceding show day.

1. Presentation of cups and awards for adults and children will commence at 4.30pm. Prize money may be collected from 4.00pm from the Show Office.
2. Unless alternative arrangements are made with the Treasurer, all adult prize-monies not collected on Show Day or within one week thereafter shall be regarded as donations to the Society.
3. All classes are open to members and non-members. Entry fee: Members 20p, Non-Members 50p, Children 20p (but 50p if entering adult classes).
4. Entries forms to be completed and sent to the Show Treasurer no later than 7 days prior to the Show. No entry will be accepted unless accompanied by the appropriate fee. 1 form per person.
5. Exhibitors will be allowed only 1 entry per class, except for poultry and egg classes, where there is a maximum of 3 entries per exhibitor.
6. No Art or craft exhibit to be more than five years old, and no exhibit to have been previously entered in the West End Show. An exhibit may only be entered in one class.
7. The hall opens at 8.00 am. Judging will start promptly at 10.30 am and no exhibitors will be allowed in the hall after this time. The Show will be open to the public at 2.00 pm.
8. Any person trying to gain prizes in a fraudulent manner will be debarred from exhibiting again, and the Committee will demand the return of any prize or prizes so gained.
9. Adult prize monies shall be: 1st £4.00, 2nd £2.50 and 3rd £1.50, unless otherwise stated. Children's prize money - see children's section. Fun Classes - vary.
10. Any exhibit carrying a label, name, or any other feature, which could identify the exhibitor, or be seen as an advertisement or promotion for any purpose, shall be disqualified and excluded from judging, unless the feature is covered over.
11. Any objection by a subscriber or exhibitor must be lodged in writing with the Secretary before 3.00 pm on the day of the Show. In all cases the decision of the Committee shall be final.
12. Exhibits in Classes 10 – 143 and 170 – 189 must be grown or made by the exhibitors.
13. The Committee reserves the right to reduce, or add to, the number of prizes in any class, at their discretion.
14. Members will be admitted to the Society on payment of the annual subscription of not less than £3, or a Special Prize of not less than £8.00 which must be paid on or before the Saturday on which entries close.
15. No exhibit may be cleared from the hall before completion of Prize Giving (can be taken from 5pm) on the day of the Show. Any exhibit not cleared by 6.00 pm will be left at the exhibitor's risk.

RULES AND REGULATIONS CONT'D

15. Awards for most points in the various sections will be calculated as follows: In classes of three prizes, 3 points for a 1st, 2 for a 2nd and 1 for a 3rd. In children's classes, 4 for a 1st, 3 for a 2nd, 2 for a 3rd and 1 for a 4th. In cases where exhibitors have equal points, the winner will be the person winning most firsts. If still equal, then most seconds, and so on.
16. Cups must be returned by winners, by the closing date for entries the following year, cleaned and ready for presentation. Please return cups to: **Mr Derek Carr, Glencairn, Brentmoor Road, West End GU24 9QQ 01483 489673 / 07920003775**
17. No exhibitor acting as a Steward may accompany a Judge in any class in which he or she is exhibiting.
18. Judging will be conducted under RHS, NDS and NHS rules where applicable.
19. Neither the Society nor any of its officers or servants shall be responsible for anything that may happen to exhibitors, their servants, or any other person or to any exhibit at the Show. It shall be considered a condition of entry that each exhibitor shall hold the Society harmless and shall be considered to indemnify the Society against any legal proceedings arising from any occurrence.
20. Where measurements are imperial, the nearest metric equivalent will be acceptable.

Fruit classes

21. In order that their natural bloom is retained, fruit should not be polished. All fruit should be exhibited with stalks attached.

Vegetable classes

22. These should be clean, fresh, tender and without blemish. Root crops should be carefully lifted and sponged in cold water. The foliage on beetroot, carrots and parsnips should be cut off to leave 75mm of leaf stalk.

Domestic class

23. All items to be presented on a plain white plate. Where necessary, sweet items should be cut with a fluted cutter and savoury items with a plain cutter. Jars for jam etc. should be plain, clean, neatly labelled with contents, well filled, with wax disc and cellophane covers. Metal tops for jam are not acceptable. Jars for chutney should have plain hard tops with wax disc inserts. Classes 87 – 94 must be home made, labelled, named and dated. Not to have been shown before. Jars should be no smaller than 8oz/227grams.

Guidance Notes

Flower Classes

Freshness is essential with no evidence of pest or disease damage. Exhibits should be staged as attractively as possible. Ensure vases contain water. In explanation of the words KIND and VARIETIES used in the schedule, dahlias and roses are KINDS of flowers, but 'Peace' and 'Red Devil' are VARIETIES of roses. All exhibits should consist of one variety, unless otherwise allowed in the schedule. In classes consisting of one variety the aim should be for uniformity. Please state variety if known.

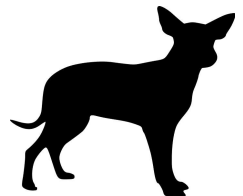

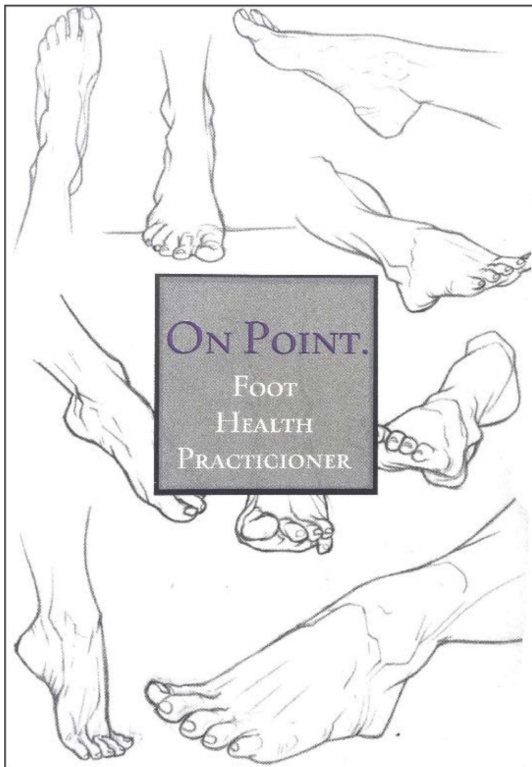
